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Dear Parents / Carers,

## HAPPY NEW YEAR!

On behalf of all the staff at school may I start by saying I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and, despite all the complications, your New Year has begun successfully. I would also like to take the opportunity to thank you all for your incredible support and patience in the run up to Christmas. I think we all know things may be complicated again as we move into January but I know, together, we will make the best of a difficult situation.

I'm sure you will have seen in the media reports of the new variant of COVID – 19 and how this spreads more easily than the previous strain. This has had particular impact in certain parts of the country and has resulted in some primary schools being told to delay reopening. At present, this is not the case in Sheffield. I am sharing with you a letter all headteachers received from Greg Fell – Sheffield's Director of Public Health. I hope this explains the reasons behind this decision. So, at present, it's business as usual! With that in mind, may I remind you of the ways in which you can help us keep everyone safe and well?

- If you or anyone in your house displays symptoms of COVID – 19, please follow the guidelines – you must all isolate and the person with symptoms must access a test
- Discuss the need for hygiene and social distancing with your child - remind them how they can keep themselves and other safe by keeping clean and keeping a safe distance
- Please ensure your child arrives at school at the allotted time – children arriving early can create unnecessary crowds which we obviously wish to avoid

As a school we have taken a number of measures to keep everybody safe. These include:

- Organising the children into 'bubbles' to reduce the amount of contacts they make
- Building in a 'hygiene' routine which makes time for handwashing
- Increasing the cleaning regime in school – each classroom is now cleaned a minimum of 3 times a day – more if necessary
- Purchase of 'chemical fogging' machines which are used on a daily basis in communal areas to reduce the risk of transmission

We also ensure that all rooms are well ventilated, whilst recognising that in the cold weather it's not always possible to have the windows open throughout the day. With all these measures in place, I hope you are able to send your child back to school with confidence. However I do understand that everyone's circumstances are different and in some cases you may take the decision that it is safer for your child to stay at home. I fully understand and respect this view and realise that in some circumstances this may be the best solution for your family in the current climate. I'd like to finish on an optimistic note! I truly believe that, whilst the next few months may be a challenge, things will gradually start to improve. I'm hoping, across the Spring and into the Summer that we will begin to feel a little bit more normal! For everybody in school this time cannot come soon enough.

Thanks again for your support. It is always much appreciated. Take care and if you have any further queries, please let me know.

Dear Headteacher,

Thank you for all that you are doing to keep our schools open and safe and for all the work you may have undertaken through the Christmas holidays. We all know how important school is for our children – for their education and for their emotional wellbeing. Following the recent national developments over the weekend regarding schools reopening we understand that you will have questions and some concerns. We are writing to outline our local advice.

We do recognise that we have to balance educational provision and the safety of school staff and pupils. Sheffield remains at this time in Tier 3 restrictions. Our latest case data up to 1<sup>st</sup> January 2021 tells us we have 175 positive COVID cases per 100,000. You will have seen the increased case rates in the South and South East of the country. London case rates at the 28<sup>th</sup> December 2020 were 762 positive COVID cases per 100,000. Transmission of the new variant of the virus means that difficult decisions are having to be made regarding the opening of schools after the Christmas holiday and placing parts of the country into Tier 4 restrictions.

There is no doubt this is more transmissible than the initial virus. There is not clear evidence to support that it is more transmissible in children per se nor that it is having a more significant impact on either children or adults. Here in Sheffield whilst our case levels are likely to increase we are confident that at this time **primary schools should reopen**. The decision for secondary schools to have a staggered opening is in order to get the testing programme up and running and is not reflective of increased virus transmission or high case rates in Sheffield.

We are very aware there is a lot of confusion and conflicting information on social media and elsewhere. Our position is based on the available scientific information as it is today, we are mindful this is continually developing, and we are reviewing it constantly.

We would support all our local primary and special schools to reopen. We know that head teachers and governing bodies are continually reviewing school-based risk assessments and having to consider staffing and capacity issues. Where schools are confident that they have adequate staffing and their risk assessments are in place schools should reopen. All schools will remain open for the children of key workers.

The Local Authority Public Health team will continue to monitor and review the situation locally. We also recognise parents and teachers fears, anxiety and concerns. The schools and school staff continue to do an amazing job. For this we thank you. We will also be speaking directly to secondary schools on 4<sup>th</sup> January 2021 about establishing the national testing programme.

We do appreciate that this has been a confusing and unsettling time for schools trying to manage the safe and effective return to school. Thank you all for your continued hard work and dedication to our children & young people.

For pupils and school staff returning to school on the 4<sup>th</sup> January 2021 we'd remind everyone of what you can do to continue to reduce COVID-19 in your community.
